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MARCH SKY EVENTS

March 5, pre-dawn: Watch for Mercury, Venus and the moon to be in the same binocular view this morning. They have very different distances from Earth this morning: the moon, just over 237,000 miles; Mercury, about 91 million miles; and Venus, about 140 million miles. They just happen today to lie on the same line of sight as seen from Earth. Very faint Neptune (almost 2.8 billion miles away) is in the view to the left of Venus, but may not be visible in the gathering twilight and a map would be necessary to tell it apart from faint stars.

March 5, late afternoon: An occultation of Venus will occur, when the moon passes directly between Earth and Venus, blocking our view. Binoculars or, better yet, a low power telescope, will be required for viewing this daytime event, and it may not be easy to see.

March 9: Daylight Saving Time Begins, banishing stars and the night sky to late in the evening.

March 14, early evening: the starlike object near the moon tonight will be Mars.

March 20, around midnight: The Vernal Equinox occurs, officially beginning Spring in the northern hemisphere.

March 28, pre-dawn: As morning twilight brightens, look at brilliant Venus in your binoculars. The fairly bright, starlike object below it will be Mercury. Slightly to the left and a little above Venus is the faint planet Uranus, but Uranus may be hard to find because of encroaching daylight.

TENATIVE SCHEDULE

6:00 pm	Arrive at the park to set up your displays
6:30	The Public Arrives
6:30-7:30	Homeschoolers share displays with the public.
6:30-7:30	Panhandle Astronomy Club members will be setting up their scopes. The public is invited to visit with these astronomers about their telescopes and to view any objects (moon, sun, etc.) that the astronomers may be looking at.
7:27	<u>Civil Twilight</u> : the horizon is clearly visible, and terrestrial objects easily perceptible, without artificial light.
7:30-8:00	Homeschoolers can pick up their displays and clean up the Shelter area.
7:30-8:00	The Panhandle Astronomy Club will do the Pocket Planets with the public.
7:59	<u>Nautical Twilight</u> : This is defined as the time when the center of the Sun is more than 6° below the horizon but less than 12°. At this time, sailors can take reliable star sights of well known stars, using a visible horizon for reference. Under good atmospheric conditions and in the absence of other illumination, general outlines of ground objects may be distinguishable, but detailed outdoor operations are not possible, and the horizon is indistinct
8:00 – 8:15	The Panhandle Astronomy Club will go over how to use star charts and star gaze etiquette with the public.
8:15-8:45	Homeschoolers give their constellation tour.
8:32	<u>Astronomical Twilight</u> : This is defined as the time when the center of the Sun is more than 12° below the horizon but less than 18°. Most casual observers would consider the entire sky already fully dark even when astronomical twilight is just beginning in the evening.
8:45-10:00	The Panhandle Astronomy Club members will have telescopes available for public viewing.



LUNAR ECLIPSE STAR PARTY

The Lunar Eclipse Star Party was held on February 20, 2008 at the Oregon Trail Park in Gering, Nebraska. There were around 40 children and adults in attendance despite the cold winter temperatures.
